Bills Introduced

Private Members' Motions

Debate resumed on Motion 1 as amended as follows:

WHEREAS the Government of Canada has proposed changes to the *Unemployed Insurance Act*, many of which will impact negatively on our province, but some of which will have a positive effect on our workforce;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick ask the Government of Canada to amend those parts of the Employed Insurance Reform that negatively impact on New Brunswick's seasonal workers, notably the calculation of benefits based on consecutive weeks, the intensity rule, and the divisor used to calculate benefits.

Mr. Robichaud moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Mockler,

THAT Motion 1 as amended be further amended:

By striking the word "and" in the last line and adding the following at the end of the word "benefits":

, and by revisiting the provisions establishing a total number of hours required to qualify for employment insurance benefits in order to make them more compatible with the existing requirements under the unemployment insurance regime.

It was agreed by unanimous consent that a 10-minute recess be declared by the chair for the purpose of considering the amendment proposed by Mr. Robichaud.

At 9.44 o'clock a.m. Mr. Speaker declared a recess.

9.58 o'clock a.m.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

And the question being put on the proposed amendment of Mr. Robichaud, seconded by Mr. Mockler, to further amend Motion 1 as amended, a debate ensued.

And the debate being ended and the question being put, the amendment to Motion 1 as amended was adopted.

And the debate continuing on Motion 1 as further amended as follows:

Government Motions re Business of House

Mr. Speaker, at the request of Hon. Mr. Frenette, reverted to Government Motions for the Ordering of the Business of the House. Hon. Mr. Frenette announced that it was the intention of government that the House resume debate on the motion for second reading of Bill 23, *An Act to Amend the Schools Act*.

Adjourned Debate on Second Reading Motion

Debate resumed on the motion that Bill 23, *An Act to Amend the Schools Act*, be now read a second time.

During debate, Hon. Mr. Frenette rose on a point of order, his point of order being that the Honourable Leader of the Opposition was not speaking to the principle of the Bill. Mr. Speaker noted the point of order well taken.

The debate continued,

And after some time, Hon. Mr. Valcourt moved the following amendment, seconded by Mr. Mockler:

THAT the motion for second reading of Bill 23, *An Act to Amend the Schools Act*, be amended by deleting all the words after "that" and substituting the following:

Bill No. 23, *An Act to Amend the Schools Act*, be not now read a second time but that the order for second reading be discharged and the subject matter of the Bill be referred to the Standing Committee on Law Amendments.

And the question being put on the proposed amendment, a debate ensued.

During the debate, the Member for Madawaska-la-Valée rose on several points of order, his points of order being that Members' debate must be relevant to the amendment.

Mr. Speaker advised Members to confine remarks to the subject matter of the amendment.
