Motion 82 by Mr. Stiles, seconded by Mr. C. LeBlanc to propose the following resolution on Tuesday, June 6, 2006:

WHEREAS the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick supports the goal of the *Canadian Firearms Act* to protect the citizens of Canada against homicides and injuries caused by firearms; and

WHEREAS the rural nature of New Brunswick means a significant proportion of law abiding citizens own and use shotguns or rifles for purposes of hunting, recreation, competition or heritage; and

WHEREAS the expensive burden of obtaining individual licenses and/or registering lawfully owned shotguns or rifles does not necessarily promote the proper use of firearms, nor does it take into account that the overwhelming majority of firearm related crimes are committed with illegally obtained and unregistered firearms; and

WHEREAS the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick supports the decision of the federal government to invest resources to better protect Canadian families and their communities by putting more police on our streets, funding crime prevention initiatives and supporting the victims of crime;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick supports the policy decision of the new Government of Canada to discontinue the long-gun registry and to protect the rights and assets of law abiding firearms owners; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick requests the Government of Canada to continue to respect its commitments made at the time of the closure of CFB Chatham by replacing the 200 jobs associated with the long-gun registry in the Miramichi region with employment of similar quantity and quality.

Motion 78 by Mr. S. Graham, seconded by Mr. Murphy to propose the following resolution on Tuesday, June 6, 2006:

WHEREAS Canada is a federation in which provinces have constitutional responsibility for the delivery of a number of essential public services to citizens, including health, social services and education;

AND WHEREAS section 36(2) of the *Constitution Act 1982* recognizes the commitment of Parliament and the Government of Canada to the principle of making equalization payments to ensure provincial governments have sufficient revenues to provide reasonably comparable levels of public services at reasonably comparable levels of taxation;

AND WHEREAS all Premiers of Canada have further agreed the federal government should strengthen its commitment to the Equalization Program so the Program meets its constitutionally mandated objective of addressing the fiscal imbalances in Canada;

AND WHEREAS a properly functioning equalization program is necessary to ensure fiscal disparities across this country do not widen resulting in non-comparative tax rates;

AND WHEREAS the Province of New Brunswick is currently a recipient of equalization payments and relies on a properly functioning program to provide quality services to its citizens and maintain its competitive position relative to the rest of Canada;

AND WHEREAS the people of New Brunswick believe a strong and effective federation is best achieved through the cooperation of all levels of government working to meet the needs of Canadians;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly reaffirms its commitment to section 36(2) of the *Constitution Act 1982* and the principle of making equalization payments to ensure provincial governments have sufficient revenues to provide reasonably comparable levels of public services at reasonably comparable levels of taxation;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly recognizes the fundamental importance of the provision of equalization payments as an essential characteristic of the Canadian federation;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly call upon the Government of Canada to enhance the current equalization program, by using a ten province model and including all revenue from non-renewable resources, to ensure it meets its constitutional mandate.

1. The new maximum rate per day for "room and board" in a New Brunswick nursing home has been set at \$79 beginning January 1, 2007. Is there a minimum rate determined by income level as there is in other provinces?
2. How will assets be evaluated in determining a senior's contribution to nursing home care? Will the 10% per year of liquid assets continue to be considered as part of family income for 5 years?
3. The government has promised that the proceeds from the sale of a principal residence are no longer to be considered part of the liquid assets for assessment purposes; therefore does the \$500 maximum savings account balance for seniors in nursing homes still apply?
4. How does a senior keep the proceeds from the sale of a principal residence separate from other savings?
5. How many nursing home residents will benefit from the changes that will be brought in January 1, 2007, i.e. how many nursing home residents are currently paying more than their OAS and GIS toward their nursing home care?
6. How many veterans in the province have the full cost of their nursing home care covered by the Department of Veterans' Affairs?
7. There was no mention in the budget of the 75%/25% split for proceeds from rental of the principal residence of a nursing home resident. Does that rule still apply? Currently the transfer of the principal residence has a 2 year look back, will this continue? Does that section 6.7 of the Standard Family Contribution Policy no longer apply?
8. Effective January 2007 government has promised that the health care cost of residents in nursing homes will be covered. What medications are included in this health care coverage? Will over the counter medication and incontinent supplies be provided at no charge?

On April 25, 2006, Justice Minister Fitch, in a Minister's Statement, announced that an additional \$3 million would be invested in the new Moncton Courthouse. This additional funding will be used for underground parking, increasing the total cost of the project to \$31 million.

In 2005, a group of five proponents (the City of Moncton, the Province, Generation Place (Verdiroc), Bernard Cyr and Assumption Life) were working on an alternative project of building the Moncton Courthouse at a different site, which included the potential of building a convention centre, hotel, entertainment center, parking and access road. This proposal was put forward but, in February 2006, Premier Lord announced that the Courthouse would be built where it was originally planned. It was indicated at that time that transferring ownership to the (5) stakeholders could create delays and cost overruns and that any increase to the \$28 million project cost was not acceptable.

Questions:

1. Why was an additional \$3 million added to the project without giving the opportunity to the group of 5 stakeholders to make a proposal to see if they could build this project at a lower cost than the now \$31 million?
2. Because of its location, there is a danger regarding water levels. In building this underground parking, what measures have been taken to ensure the security (water level) of potential users of this underground parking?
3. Will this new addition to the Courthouse project result in any water contamination or affect the water level in any way? If so, how? What steps need to be taken to mitigate any environmental damage that may occur?
4. What environmental study(ies) have been made and what results have been reached on the issue of water level for the Courthouse building and underground parking? Will any of these studies be made available to the public and when?
5. Are there any other budget increases for the Courthouse building being planned over the additional \$3 million that was announced on April 25, 2006? If so, what are they and what are they for?
