Pursuant to Standing Rule 10, Mr. Jamieson rose on a point of privilege to correct statements published in the media regarding his resignation from Cabinet on Friday last. Mr. Jamieson informed the House that he had removed himself from caucus and remained a Liberal Member.

Mr. Northrup, Member for Kings East, laid upon the table of the House a petition on behalf of residents of Roachville, Sussex, Piccadilly, Sussex Corner, Carsonville, Penobsquis and surrounding areas who oppose the sale of NB Power to Hydro-Québec. (Petition 186)

Ms. Dubé, Member for Edmundston—Saint-Basile, laid upon the table of the House a petition on behalf of residents of Fredericton, Chipman, New Maryland, Charters Settlement, Moncton, Centreville, Taymouth, Lincoln and surrounding areas who oppose the sale of NB Power to Hydro-Québec. (Petition 187)

Mr. Olscamp, Member for Tantramar, laid upon the table of the House a petition on behalf of residents of Dalhousie, New Mills, Nash Creek, Dalhousie Junction, Benjamin River, Blackland and surrounding areas who oppose the sale of NB Power to Hydro-Québec. (Petition 188)

Mr. D. Graham, Member for Carleton, laid upon the table of the House a petition on behalf of residents of Moncton, River Glade, Upper Coverdale, Salisbury, Boundary Creek, Turtle Creek, Sackville and surrounding areas who oppose the sale of NB Power to Hydro-Québec. (Petition 189)

Hon. Mr. Arseneault, Deputy Government House Leader, announced that it was the intention of government that the House resolve itself into a Committee of Supply to consider the estimates of the Office of Human Resources and the Aboriginal Affairs Secretariat.

New Professionals Initiative	827,000
Aboriginal Affairs Secretariat	1,407,000
