Comments of the Chief Electoral Officer on the November 28, 2022, Local Government Elections


“WITHOUT GEOGRAPHY YOU’RE NOWHERE”

Jimmy Buffet, singer

Those lyrics from singer Jimmy Buffet perfectly encapsulate the context in which these elections were conducted. The November 2022 local government elections presented our organization with significant challenges, many of which were tied to delays in obtaining geography information. In the world of election administration, the phrase “every election starts with geography” speaks volumes. The importance of having accurate geographical information cannot be overstated. The borders of each electoral area, including the boundaries of wards, if they exist, are critical in determining the design of polling divisions to which electors will be assigned. Geographical information is also essential in determining the locations of polling stations that are selected for each election. Additional downstream effects related to geography include decisions respecting staffing requirements for each municipal electoral region, and the resource requirements to open returning offices and polling stations for the elections.

As far back as November 2021, even before government publicly announced its plans to create completely new restructured entities, we emphasized to the Department of Environment and Local Government the importance of confirming the boundaries of these new entities as soon as possible. We indicated that March 4, 2022, was our deadline for locking down the boundaries of each local government and rural district, including the wards within each. This would then allow sufficient time for our staff to design polling divisions and place electors’ homes into the correct polling divisions, ensuring electors would be sent to the correct polling stations on voting days and avoiding the problems that result when this is incorrect, ranging from voter inconvenience to contested election results. This would also provide sufficient time to test and correct the supporting IT systems needed to link the geography to the various electoral contests.

Unfortunately, the deadline for finalizing the geography of these new entities was missed, and timelines were repeatedly pushed back further. In February 2022, we were informed by the Department of Environment and Local Government that the March 4, 2022, deadline would not be met. We agreed that, so long as we received the geography data throughout the month of March, a deadline of March 31, 2022, to receive all geographical boundaries, including wards, was acceptable to Elections NB. In late June 2022, we were advised that only two-thirds of the ward boundaries were complete. When municipal returning officers attended training in August 2022, the boundaries of the entities in their regions were still not finalized, and we were unable to provide them with maps of the polling divisions in their respective regions.



In fact, corrections continued into the fall. On October 12, 2022, a mere 16 days before the close of nominations, the Minister of Local Government and Local Governance Reform filed amendments to the Local Governments Establishment Regulation under the *Local Governance Act* to fix errors identified in the councillor composition of wards in eight of the new entities. And finally, on December 16, 2022, *An Act Respecting Local Governance Reform, 2022*, no.2, S.N.B. 2022, c.56, received Royal Assent. This Act, amongst other things, further amended the Local Governments Establishment Regulation in order to correct errors identified in the council composition in the new entity of Valley Waters and directed that a by-election to fill the additional council seat be held in February 2023.

My comments above are not intended to assign blame or provide excuses, but are rather meant to provide some context to readers of this report on the challenges that we faced as we set out to administer these local government elections on November 28, 2022.

To appreciate how impactful the delays in geography were on our operations, it may be helpful to understand how much the timelines for these elections deviated from our normal processes. Section 10 of the *Municipal Elections Act* provides as follows with respect to the establishment of polling divisions:

10(1) For each general election the Municipal Electoral Officer shall, with the assistance of the municipal returning officers, subdivide each municipality into as many polling divisions as is considered necessary giving due consideration to geographical and all other factors that may affect the convenience of the voters in casting their votes.

10(2) The Municipal Electoral Officer shall, with the assistance of the municipal returning officers, prepare a list of the polling divisions determined under subsection (1) no later than the thirty-first day of December in the year before the year in which an election is to be held.

By virtue of subsection 12(4) of *An Act Respecting Local Governance Reform, S.N.B. 2021, c.44*, changes to polling divisions for the November 28, 2022, elections were permitted after December 31, 2021. This in and of itself would not necessarily have been problematic, as general elections are typically held in May. If one were to apply the general time frame from section 10 of the *Municipal Elections Act* to the November 28, 2022, event, one would have expected that the polling divisions would

be completed no later than June 30, 2022. However, the base geography upon which polling divisions are then determined was still a work in progress as of that date.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS SUMMARY AND STATISTICS

The restructuring of local governments by the Department of Environment and Local Government resulted in the following elections being held on November 28, 2022: first elections in 50 new local governments; first-elections for 12 newly created rural district advisory committees; and by-elections in eight other existing local governments. By-elections were also held at the same time to fill pre-existing vacancies in Oromocto and Tracadie.

In total, 446 positions were available to be contested at the start of these elections. Following the close of nominations on Friday, October 28, 2022, and the subsequent deadline for the withdrawal of candidates, 796 candidates remained for all positions.

- Of the 50 mayoral positions to elect, 15 were elected by acclamation
- 102 councillor candidates were elected by acclamation. 250 councillor positions were contested in 55 local governments.
- 20 rural district advisory committee members were elected by acclamation. Twelve rural district advisory committee member positions were contested in 6 local governments.

After the election, four council positions remained vacant in three local governments. (Beaurivage – Ward 2; Valley Waters – Ward 2; and Sunbury York South - Ward 1). A total of eight positions remained vacant on five of the rural district advisory committees. The advisory committee vacancies will be filled by a ministerial appointment made by the Minister of Local Government and Local Governance Reform.

POLLING DIVISIONS AND POLLING LOCATIONS

In these elections, there were 962 polling divisions in the affected entities. Following the withdrawal of candidates, a total of 175 unique ballot styles were required. In total, 273,800 ballots were printed for this election.

One hundred and five polling stations were opened for advance polls, while 185 polling stations opened for ordinary polling day on Monday, November 28, 2022.

In total, 327 tabulation machines were deployed across the Province to collect the vote of electors.

VOTERS

These elections for restructured local government entities and newly formed rural district advisory committees were province-wide, but did not involve electors in 18 municipalities, including those living in major urban centers such as Fredericton, Saint John, Moncton, Dieppe and Riverview. While the registry of electors maintained by ElectionsNB had over 571,000 electors listed in October 2022, the preliminary list of electors for the November elections only had 278,954 listed as eligible to vote. Following the close of nominations and the contests filled by acclamation, only 232,004 electors were eligible to request a ballot to vote in these elections.



In total, 82,982 voters cast ballots across New Brunswick.

- 6,541 voters cast special ballots. Special ballots are used to collect the vote from electors who are in hospital, reside in special care homes, are housebound, are incarcerated in correctional facilities, choose to vote by mail, and any other elector who chooses to vote at a returning office.
- 25,772 voters cast ballots at the advance polls held on November 19, and November 21, 2022.
- 50,669 voters cast ballots at the ordinary polls held on Monday, November 28, 2022.
- Following the close of nominations, 46,819 eligible electors living in areas impacted by the local government restructuring did not have contests in which they could cast a ballot.

Overall voter turnout in restructured areas with an election was 35.77%.

PRE-ELECTION MAILER

For the third straight province-wide election, we sent a mail out to every household listed in our voter registry. The primary purpose was to have electors update their voter information if it had changed since the previous election held in May 2021.



Targeted communications from the Department of Environment and Local Government to educate the public as to which communities would fall in newly restructured entities requiring an election did not materialize. By August 2022, based upon the calls and queries we received from the public, it became evident that people were unsure if they would be participating in the elections.

Given that the November 28, 2022, elections would not involve electors in 18 municipalities, including those living in the province's largest urban centers, a decision was made to modify the pre-election mailer process to send tailor-made messages to those who would be

voting in the election and a separate message to those who would not be having an election. In addition, a post-card sized flyer encouraging people to consider running as a candidate was quickly designed and printed to be included in the envelopes destined for households in the areas holding elections.

As has been well publicized, those plans backfired – significantly! Unfortunately, due to the lateness of receiving final geographical information, the pre-election mailer needed to be delayed a week while contest information was updated at the last minute. In addition, due to an error in the naming convention of the data files sent to the vendor who prepared the envelopes for us, in two of the four batches of data, the message meant for those not having an election went to households in areas where elections were going to take place and visa versa. The reversal of the messages was not caught in our internal proofing process prior to approving the printing and mailing of the information. In the event that customized and distinct messages are ever included in our pre-election mailer in the future, internal proofing procedures were immediately modified to ensure a similar error would be identified and not distributed to the public.

We took quick and decisive action to make people aware that we had made the mistake. Along with issuing a news release the morning after we became aware of the error and pushing out a message through our social media channels, I responded to numerous media requests in which I attempted to explain how the mistake had occurred and took ownership of the error. It is important to note that our vendor had indicated that, due to a global-wide paper shortage, it would take upwards of four months to procure new envelopes if we were to consider sending a corrected message to those households with incorrect information. We investigated sending a simple, unaddressed mailout using generic envelopes or postcards; however, it quickly became clear that this option would not result in the correct messaging reaching the appropriate households in a timely manner and would have been far more likely to create even greater confusion in the short time available.

CALL CENTER

In spite of its errors, the pre-election mailout did generate awareness of the fact an election was taking place on November 28, 2022. The temporary call center set up to handle inquiries received over 6,000 calls during the 10 weeks it was in operation. Roughly 85% of the calls were from electors either confirming or updating their voter information.

The table below summarizes the nature of the calls handled by the 12 bilingual operators, including a call center manager, who staffed the call center six days a week. These inquiries do not account for the hundreds of calls handled by our reception desk, or the email inquiries received by our office.

RESULTS REPORTING

With few, if any, media organizations providing real-time reporting of local government election results on election night, the Elections NB website has become the primary source for most journalists and candidates to track results.

The first group of results, from 65 of the 327 tabulation machines used in the elections, were uploaded and exported to the public website at 8:16 p.m. A second batch of 172 results were exported to the public website at 8:36 p.m. Successive, smaller batches of results continued to be published until the final results were reported at 10:04 p.m.

New Brunswick still has small pockets of geography where connectivity to cell towers is unreliable. Modem transmission of results did not work for 19 of 327 tabulation machines. In these cases, the results were first called in manually to the local returning offices. Once polling materials were returned, the digital files were uploaded later that evening.

The day after the election, six additional ballots that were not correctly tabulated at the polls were identified by municipal returning officers as they followed their standard verification processes. Votes from these ballots were manually added to the results tallies, which were subsequently republished. Fortunately, none of these ballots affected the outcomes reported on election evening.

RETURNING OFFICE RECOUNTS

Following the declarations of the winning candidates, there were 42 contests in which the margin of victory between the successful and unsuccessful candidates was less than 25 votes. In such cases, a candidate who has not been elected may request that the municipal returning officer conduct a recount.

- Thirteen candidates requested recounts.
- Following the recounts, three candidates saw their results change by one vote each in two contests (Nouvelle-Arcadie - Ward 4 and Vallée-des-Rivières - Ward 4).
- Overall, 6,813 ballots were recounted for the contests involved. All candidates declared elected on election night were confirmed as the winning candidates following the recounts.
- No judicial recounts were subsequently requested.

A candidate who observed a recount that took place in Sussex sent the municipal returning officer an email following the recount praising the transparency of the process. He gave us permission to use a portion of his comments in this post-election report:

"You and the Team did an excellent, excellent job with this... Staff were serious (all business) Total Transparency and prompt response to questions when there were some. ... Nothing wrong with electronic tabulation..... Again WELL done !!... gives me faith in our democracy... A democracy cannot function without faith and some virtue... I just knew you folks were guardians of all the votes!"

MUNICIPAL RETURNING OFFICERS

This was the first election held after legislation was passed granting authority to the Chief Electoral Officer to hire provincial and municipal returning officers. A three-person committee was established to conduct a merit-based competition to hire the returning officers for this election. The committee was comprised of two senior staff members from Elections NB and a former returning officer with both federal and provincial election experience. A robust advertising campaign was used to promote the search for candidates interested in applying for the 17 available positions. In addition, notice of the recruitment process was emailed to a list of individuals who had worked previously for Elections NB in senior field staff positions, such as returning officers and election clerks. Interviews for the positions were held in April 2022, and the successful candidates were notified in early May 2022.



In August 2022, Elections NB held four weeks of training in Fredericton for the municipal returning officers and their election clerks, training officers and technical support officers. The sessions were offered in both official languages at our new location on Two Nations Crossing in Fredericton. These training sessions were the first opportunity for Elections NB to take full advantage of our new facility, which we had moved into at the end of June 2022. For the first time, Elections NB's head office and warehouse operations are co-located, with the building including onsite training space. The operational efficiencies of our new home were quickly realized during this training. Some of the efficiencies and conveniences of having everyone, and everything,

in one place for training included: easy set-up and tear down by the warehouse and technical staff; sufficient connectivity to train staff on and demonstrate technology; head office staff were able to conveniently and efficiently transition between providing training and continuing with their routine work; ready access to technical support; and access to all head office staff to address questions and make decisions that arose during training. The feedback from permanent staff and our returning office trainees to the new training environment was unanimously and overwhelmingly positive.

The municipal returning officers set up their offices during the first week of October. On October 11, 2022, municipal returning offices opened to the public and for candidates to submit their nomination papers.

As the Municipal Electoral Officer for New Brunswick, I want to thank the 17 municipal returning officers and their staff for helping us to successfully administer these local government elections. I extend the same gratitude to the thousands of individuals who accepted jobs as poll workers at the 290 polling stations opened for advance voting and on election day.

LANGUAGE OF SERVICE

Elections NB received notice of one complaint filed with the Office of the Commissioner of Official Languages following the election. It involved a phone call made to our reception desk in Fredericton. The line to the reception desk was busy at the time, and the voice mailbox associated with that phone line was full, so the caller was transferred to an auto attendant set up by our external provider. Unfortunately, that recorded message was in unilingual English. The commissioner's office made us aware of the issue before the individual filed an official complaint with them, and corrective action was taken immediately. In notifying us of the complaint, the Office of the Commissioner of Official Languages indicated it felt that the issue had been appropriately dealt and in a timely manner, so they considered the matter resolved.

ELECTION COSTS

In February 2022, Elections NB submitted its request for funding to the Legislative Administration Committee of the Legislative Assembly. This request included the direct costs of a province-wide municipal general election in support of the government's Local Government Reform initiatives.

At the time of preparing this report, the direct costs are expected to be as follows:

Indirect costs incurred to maintain infrastructure related to elections will be reported in the annual report of Elections NB. Such infrastructure is used at both municipal and provincial elections and includes equipment that must be maintained between elections, such as tabulation machines, computer hardware and other information technology (IT) equipment and systems.

GOING FORWARD

Following each election, we conduct a thorough review of how processes and procedures unfolded during the event, bringing together head office staff, returning officers and election clerks. In many instances, the feedback collected helps to inform us on improvements we will take under consideration for future elections. That exercise continues even as this report is sent for design and printing.

As mentioned earlier, even before this election had concluded, senior management at Elections NB had implemented changes to the standard operating procedures in the proofing and verifying of voter information cards and any future mail-outs.

As emphasized in my opening comments, I would also stress again the importance of the departments for whom we administer elections to meet the legal and operational timelines required to finalize electoral geography and to implement the necessary changes.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

In closing, I would be remiss if I did not offer my deepest gratitude to staff at Elections NB and employees at the municipal returning offices who pivoted as needed to respond to the challenges that we faced during these elections.



I would also like to thank the private sector companies that supply and deliver, often on critical timelines, the goods and services we require to effectively administer our elections.

I also offer my thanks to the thousands of election workers province-wide who assisted us in successfully delivering these elections by being the face of Elections NB to all the New Brunswickers who exercised their right to vote at polling stations across the province. Without election officers who do such important and critical work at returning offices and polling stations, it would not be possible for us to deliver on Election NB's mandate to conduct free and fair elections for all New Brunswickers.


Detailed Digital Information

During these elections, it is possible for an elector, depending on his or her particular polling division, to vote for any combination of the following contests: Mayor, Councillor at Large, or Ward Councillor, and Rural Districts Advisory Committee Members at Large and Ward Members.

Summary Of Local Government Elections

CANDIDATES

In total, 406 mayor or councillor positions in 65 local governments and 40 advisory committee member positions in 12 rural districts were contested at the start of the elections. Following the close of nominations on Friday, October 28, 2022, and the subsequent deadline for withdrawals on Monday, October 31, 2022, 802 individuals had filed nomination papers to run as a candidate in one or more contests.

• In local governments:

- 118 candidates were nominated for 50 mayoral positions. Four of these candidates withdrew their nomination papers and filed nomination papers for a different council position prior to the deadline. One additional candidate withdrew and did not re-offer for a different position.
- 652 candidates were nominated for 356 council positions. Five of these candidates withdrew their nomination papers and filed nomination papers for a different council position prior to the deadline. Five additional candidates withdrew and did not re-offer for a different position.
- 15 mayoral candidates were elected by acclamation; contested mayoral elections were held in 50 local governments.
- 102 councillor candidates were elected by acclamation; contested councillor elections were held for at-large positions or ward positions in 55 local governments.
- In four local governments, no elections were required because all the contested mayor and councillor positions in this election were elected by acclamation or had remaining vacancies.
- Four councillor positions in three local governments (Beaurivage, Valley Waters, and Sunbury-York South) remained vacant after the deadline for nomination withdrawals. These vacancies will be filled in by-elections in 2023.

• In Rural Districts:

- 42 candidates were nominated for 40 rural district advisory committee member positions. One of these candidates withdrew their nomination papers and filed nomination papers for a different advisory committee position prior to the deadline. No additional candidates withdrew and did not re-offer for a different position.
- 20 advisory committee member candidates were elected by acclamation; contested advisory committee member elections were held for at-large positions or ward positions in 6 rural districts.
- In six of the twelve rural districts, no elections were required because all the contested advisory committee positions in this election were elected by acclamation or had remaining vacancies.
- Eight advisory committee member positions in five rural districts (Chaleur rural district, Fundy rural district, Kings rural district, Southeast rural district, Western Valley rural district) remained vacant after the deadline for nomination withdrawals. These vacancies will be filled by Ministerial appointment in accordance with ss. 176.21(1) of the *Local Governance Act*.

PARTICIPATION

Following the deadline for nomination withdrawals, there were 232,004 electors eligible to vote in local governments or rural districts in which an election for mayor, councillor, or advisory committee member was held.

Of these, 82,982 electors cast ballots in these contests, bringing the average local government election participation rate to 35.77 %.

The highest participation rate was in Île-de-Lamèque (55.96 %), and the lowest participation rate was in Fundy rural district (2.5 %).

46,819 electors lived in polling divisions in a local government that did not require an election for mayor, councillor, or advisory committee member.

RECOUNTS

Following election day, recounts were requested in 13 contests in twelve local governments because of the closeness of the vote. Following each recount conducted by the Municipal Returning Officer, no changes to the elected candidates were made.
