Her Honour, the Lieutenant-Governor, was announced, and having been bidden to enter, took her seat in the chair upon the Throne.

Mr. Speaker addressed Her Honour as follows:

Mr. Speaker then addressed Her Honour as follows:

May It Please Your Honour:

The Legislative Assembly having devoted itself with unremitting diligence to the consideration of the several subjects referred to in the speech Her Honour the Lieutenant-Governor was pleased to deliver at the opening of the session, and to other matters of interest to the people of the province, humbly begs to present for your Honour's acceptance a Bill intituled *Appropriations Act* 2024-2025. Her Honour replied:

Her Honour thanks His Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill.

Her Honour was pleased to deliver the following message:

Good morning,

I realize this may be our last time together in this historic Chamber as the 60th Legislative Assembly.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for everything you do to improve New Brunswickers' quality of life. Politics is a difficult field to work in, and the personal cost is high. You have to be composed, courageous, and resilient—I tip my hat to you. I also want to thank your families, who provide you with incredible support in your work.

One of my main priorities throughout this mandate has been social cohesion. I truly believe that diversity is one of our greatest strengths, and despite our differences, it's clear to me that New Brunswickers have so much in common. In visiting communities across the province, I've witnessed acts of kindness, empathy, cooperation and unity, which give me hope for a future where all New Brunswickers are celebrated for who they are.

Wherever the future takes you this fall, I encourage you to continue promoting the shared values representative of New Brunswick and its people. I encourage you to continue your efforts and to inspire the people around you to make a difference in their communities.

Her Honour then retired and Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

Following Ministers' Statements, Mr. Speaker requested that Ms. Holt withdraw the words "talking out of one side of his mouth" and "teaching kids to lie", which she did.

Hon. Ms. M. Wilson, Member for Oromocto-Lincoln-Fredericton, laid upon the table of the House a petition urging government to keep a school in Burton. (Petition 21)

Ms. Mitton gave Notice of Motion 80 that on Thursday, June 13, 2024, she would move the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Coon:

June 7

WHEREAS the widespread and systemic use of non-disclosure agreements (NDAs) has been found to suppress information about unlawful activities, including but not limited to harassment, discrimination, and other misconduct;

WHEREAS NDAs are routinely used to cover up abuse in schools, youth clubs, universities, organizations and religious institutions, where revealing the details of the settlement may result in reputational risk or criminal charges against the perpetrator;

WHEREAS victims and survivors of harassment and discrimination are frequently compelled to sign NDAs, which can prevent them from reporting or discussing their concerns with family, friends, coworkers, or therapists;

WHEREAS the use of NDAs undermines the principles of transparency and accountability that are fundamental to a just society;

WHEREAS Ontario, Manitoba, Nova Scotia, British Columbia, and Prince Edward Island have introduced legislation restricting or banning the use of NDAs in cases of harassment and discrimination, demonstrating a growing recognition of their detrimental effects;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly urge the government to enact legislation to prohibit the use of NDAs that serve to conceal details and evidence of harassment, discrimination, and other forms of misconduct.

On motion of Hon. Mr. G. Savoie, seconded by the Honourable the Premier:

RESOLVED, that when the Assembly adjourns at the end of this sitting day, it stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 19, 2024.

Mr. Speaker recognized Hon. Mr. Holland to make a farewell speech in the House.
